How to Register on MyNEC

- Log in to MyNEC (<http://www.nec.edu/students-faculty-staff/>)
- Click on “FERPA Declaration, Student Services & Financial Aid”
- Click on “Registration”
- Click on “Add/Drop Classes”
- Choose the correct term- Spring – 2021 15 Weeks
- Enter CRN numbers and hit “Submit Changes”
If you need to find an additional class, click on “Class Search.”
- To see all of the classes offered, click on the top “Subject”, drag through the list. You can then refine your search to look by department, LAS requirement, etc.
 - Click on “Course Search”
 - This will bring up all of the class offerings for the term.
 - NOTE: Classes that are at the 5000-level or above are graduate courses and you may not sign up for them.
 - Closed classes have “C” on the left, open classes have box.
 - To sign up for the class, click on the box and a check will be inserted.
 - Click on “Register” at the bottom of the page.
 - If the class will work with your schedule, it will be added.
 - If there is a problem (time conflict, prerequisite) you will see a red error box.
- To confirm you are registered, return to the Registration Menu and select “Student Detail Schedule.”

AR 3990 Contemporary Art

This course is an in-depth exploration of theory and practice in the visual arts from the aftermath of World War II to the present. Issues discussed include the legacy of modernism, the exploration of media and subject matter, and the relationship between art and society. Media covered include painting, sculpture, photography, printmaking, architecture, and design, along with performance, film and video, and conceptual art.

BU/SM 3990 Sport Media

This course examines the role media plays in contemporary sports, the relationship between sport and sport media, and how these two entities influence the public's perception of the sport's industry. Many professional careers associated with sport media will be discussed including sports information, public/media relations, journalism, and broadcasting. Students will learn how to conduct interviews with sports figures, create media and promotional materials, write game and feature stories, and to effectively utilize social media as a promotional tool.

CJ 3990 Federal Crimes and Procedure

This is a course will present an inquiry into, and understanding of, federal criminal law and procedure. We will work directly with the same materials used by federal agents, federal prosecutors, defense attorneys, and judges. We will consider the same issues that federal law enforcement agents and prosecutors deal with in investigating and prosecuting violations of federal crimes. The topics we will cover include a survey of federal criminal offenses as outlined in Title 18, of the United States Code (the main criminal code of the Federal Government), as well as procedural issues such motions to suppress, grand jury investigations, charging, first appearances, change of pleas, trial and sentencing. We will also examine such issues as handling cooperators and undercover investigations, utilizing electronic surveillance, gathering cooperating witness evidence, dealing with problems that arise in the course of federal investigations, and bringing it all together through a prosecution and the use of gathered evidence at trial and sentencing.

CJ 3990 Human Trafficking

During this semester long course students will be exposed to foundational human trafficking principles. Lessons learned will allow them to articulate advanced illegal human trafficking practices, and the global impact of this industry. Through course materials and online round table discussions, students begin to see the criminal, and terrorism links, human trafficking is associated with.

CJ 3990 Tp: Interviews & Interrogation

This course provides an in-depth examination of interpersonal communications with a specific focus on interviews conducted by law enforcement, including victim, witness, informant, and subject interviews. Emphasis is placed on rapport-based

interviewing techniques; developing effective questioning strategies; identifying, managing, and avoiding common forms of resistance; adapting to intercultural situations; and identifying and managing deception. Each component of the course is backed by the most recent academic research in the field. Prerequisites: CJ 1110, CJ 2130.

CW 2990 Genre Workshop: Hybridity

The hybrid genre in creative writing is an increasingly popular form where diverse genres such as nonfiction and memoir, poetry, fiction, and visual images are blended together in documents to create a cross-genre blended landscape of meaning. With a foundation that challenges conventional assumptions of form and content, hybridity asks both writers and readers to consider the threads that hold language together in order to create meaning. Prerequisite: CW1100 or permission of instructor

LAS 1110 Communicating Nature

In *The Nature Principle*, author Richard Louv tells us: "The more high-tech we become, the more we need nature." Does modern life allow us to be in tune with nature? In this high-tech world, how interdependent are we with other humans and the life supporting eco-systems around us? In *Communicating Nature*, author Julia B. Corbett looks to have us understand that all the message we have been fed through many forms of communication have helped to frame our view of nature. By exploring and analyzing the language used in discussions of the natural world as it streams to us from any sources: news outlets, conservation blogs and websites, poets, writer, corporate mission statement, documentaries, soundscape ecology, advertising images we can step back and look critically at our own beliefs. What does it mean to be "Human" within our natural world? This class looks to be a fun, dynamic, and interactive course! We need your participation to help make it great! Using a multi-disciplinary approach this class will engage readings, documentaries, and the exploration of the land itself, to better understand what it means to see ourselves as being a part of nature. To see ourselves as growing to care for the human fulfillment nature may provide. We will consider whether the idea that our rampant use of technologies has caused us to step further away from nature, further than at any other time in our evolutionary process. And is this even a concern to you?

LAS 1110 Ethics and Capitalism

Capitalism has been a powerful force in shaping the world as we know it. But has the output been morally good or bad? How do we weigh the opportunity afforded through the free-market with the marginalization, oppression, and pervasive inequality within the distribution of primary social goods? This course examines that very question by first exploring a normative ethical framework, upon which, to evaluate morality. Capitalism and some related economic concepts will be defined and will serve as the focus of the moral evaluation. Related literature, historical events, political theory, recent organizational trends, and sociological phenomena will also be included within the evaluation.

LAS 1110 Tigers, Trees, and People

Business, society, and the environment are connected in surprising ways with surprising results. In our interconnected world, each of us bears responsibility in building a sustainable future. This class looks at this interconnection and evaluates the ways business shapes outcomes for the environment and society. We will explore examples where business' influence on the environment and society has been both positive and negative and attempt to draw out some conclusions. Many of the examples we will study are in countries across the globe; others are much closer to home. Finally, we will look at new structures and models of business being developed – innovations that allow us to simultaneously achieve business and societal goals without damaging the environment. Using real life examples, case studies, in-class exercises, and field trips, the class will see sustainability in action as well as learn about it. Building sustainable communities requires participation from all of us, and this class is your invitation to lead.

LAS 1110 Understanding Our Place in Nature

This course gives students a multi-faceted view of the place of humanity in the web of life comprising the natural environment.

LAS 1110 Will Climate Change Change My Life?

As we enter the social and environmental disruptions of a rapidly changing climate, what is, and will be, the impact on you? This course is designed to help students understand a global environmental problem in the context of their own lives. To reach this point students will research and discuss the scientific method, climate research techniques, and the current predictions of climate change impacts on a global, national and regional scale. We will explore the inherent social issues of a global event including climate refugees, social justice, economic disruption, and cultural change and how these could impact students. Given a background in the current science, students' final project will be to design a lifestyle concept map. It will serve as a visual framework of the impact of climate change on an individual, and an outline of behavior that could reduce greenhouse gasses and mitigate the impact of climate change.

LAS 1120 Civil Rights and the Graphic Novel

By reading and analyzing the stories of others, this course will allow us to examine the unique experiences of individuals of varying race, gender, sexual orientation and religious affiliation and see how their experience of society may differ from what we perceive in our own lives. This course will look at the way we perceive the society and culture we live in, and how our perceptions may differ from others, unlike ourselves, who live in that same society, and we will examine how our limited perspective may influence the way we treat and perceive others. From there, we will understand how the human rights—as defined by the Universal Declaration of Human Rights—of historically marginalized groups have not been respected, protected or preserved, and what recourse people have had to take in order to gain or defend their rights.”

LAS 1120 Conflict on Campus: Ethics/College Life

How do hundreds or thousands of students from all walks of life come together on a college campus to form a community? Not easily, that's how. This course takes a hands-on approach to the many ethical and social issues facing American college campuses today, from cheating and plagiarism to free speech and campus protests. Spotting the community of college students on America's campuses, this course covers a diverse array of social, ethical, and political issues that concern the civic environment and democratic values campus communities today. Beginning its journey across the campus with a foundation in moral theory, the course then considers such topics as: academic integrity, speech and protest, affirmative action, sports, alcohol and drugs, hazing, religion on campus, sex, date rape and sexual harassment, plus contemporary issues in the national news and on NEC's own campus.

Students will cover multiple case studies and real-life scenarios, including those right here on the NEC campus, and gain valuable skills in recognizing the complexity of issues and dealing with them in a thoughtful and critical manner.

LAS 1120 Exp Amer: Balance Land Mgmt

This course comes on the back side of the National Parks Service Centennial, one year after the National Parks Service has turned 100, a few months after the presidential election, and months after numerous controversial actions and protests have occurred. What does this all mean for the land that we have set aside to preserve, enjoy, explore, and more? An exploration into the history of Land management from both a political and outdoor perspective. The many facets of land management will be used as the basis for discussion, debate, and research. The experiential component during this course will be a group project that serves, researches, or explores land set aside for public use.

LAS 1120 Human Rights on the World Stage

The struggle for human dignity, justice, and freedom is universal and timeless; it recognizes neither cultural nor historical boundaries. From Sophocles' Antigone to the Vanek Plays of Vaclav Havel, theatre and film artists have persistently and forcefully rebelled against tyranny, oppression, and exploitation in all their forms. These themes will be explored through a variety of films and two live theatre productions

LAS 1120 Sympathy for the Devil

Have you ever gotten the chills watching a spider crawl on someone's arm? What about winced in pain when someone else hit his or her forehead on a low-hanging beam? Have you ever identified with a fictional character's struggle you read in a book? The spider wasn't on your arm; the beam didn't hit your forehead, and you're not the character in the book. In each instance, however, you seemed to experience another's suffering. That's empathy, and whenever empathy is lacking, so, too, are the capacity to see others as fully human and the values inherent to a democracy—impossible becomes the affirmation in Article 1 of The Universal Declaration of Human Rights that, “All human beings are born free and equal in dignity and rights. They are endowed with reason and conscience and should act towards one another

in a spirit of brotherhood.” The recent groundswell of interest in empathy, however, may be due more to our growing unwillingness to understand and share the feelings of another, especially those unlike ourselves. Using an interdisciplinary approach, this course explores the critical role empathy plays in any Civic environment based upon democratic values and in solving increasingly complex societal ills as well as how literature can help us empathically “enlarge ourselves,” as Richard Rorty puts it.

LAS 1120 The Humanity in Sports

Sport can be considered a microcosm of society because of its many different social issues that are also reflected in society at large. Examples include racism, gender inequity, social class exclusion, greed and corruption, diversity, and violence. However, when viewed as a culturally valued human practice (Arnold, 1992), sport can become a power vehicle for fostering important human values and beliefs such as fairness, respect, freedom, compassion, and democracy. Thus, the purpose of this class is to: 1) familiarize students with a variety of social issues that occur in sport as they relate to human rights, 2) examine these various issues through sociological and philosophical lenses, and 3) develop students’ understanding of the “practice view of sport” which can in turn be used to appreciate the application of important moral and societal values.

LAS 3110 Climate Change:Adapt/Mitigation

The pre-eminent environmental problem for this and future generations is rapid climate change (RCC). RCC has negative impacts on health, wildlife and plants, national security, businesses and income, safety, agriculture, sports, infrastructure and lifestyle, among others. The actions society is taking to avert the worst-case scenarios are divided into adaptation and mitigation. The Climate Change Adaptation and Mitigation Lab (CCAMLab) reviews many of the existing options, and where feasible, implements them in a small scale to determine their efficacy at NEC. Do energy saving outlets work in dorm rooms? Will planting trees on campus sequester carbon? Would students accept a reduced meat menu in the cafeteria? What type of marketing works best to convince students and staff to reduce energy use? If instructors taught once/week from home, would this significantly reduce the carbon from driving their cars? The results of the testing will be compiled into a policy paper for climate action on campus. This course satisfies the LAS 7 requirement.

LAS 3110 When Democracy Fails

Working with the philosophical frameworks of Plato, Locke, Hobbs and Rousseau, this class will explore the fundamental elements of democratic theory and the strengths and weaknesses of democracy as a political ideal. Taking into account current struggles of people worldwide to establish democratic rule, a central question will be: once fought for and established, what are the issues that threaten democracy's survival? Examples of historical failures of democracy, i.e., Athens, and Germany before the Nazi takeover, will be investigated in relation to current political/social movements, in order to gain some insight into how/why democracies can fail.

OE 1990 Leave No Trace Ethics

We enter the backcountry, wilderness, parks, and more and the familiar saying “Leave only footprints; take only memories” may come to mind. There is an ethic for how we spend time in the wilderness. Leave no Trace has seven principles that are easily understood and practiced by leaders and encouraged in National Parks, Forests, and more. This course is taught by a certified instructor and has the goal of helping people understand their impact on the land as well as how to minimize this impact. This is a great course for all people who spend time in nature.

PL 2990 Chasing Philosophy Through Literature

Philosophy analyzes the core questions of what it means to be human. Unfortunately, the responses returned are often more difficult to understand than the questions themselves, and, at times, of life itself. In this course, we will use literature to chase answers to some of the questions that have been evading philosophical resolution for millennia. Why use literature? Literature does not pretend to understand these same questions completely or resolve these same questions “once and for all”. Literature assumes our “unhandsome condition” as a starting point. We are afforded therefore only temporary stays, fleeting glimpses, into these vital questions. As Stanley Cavell has noted, the importance may not be so much in the finding as in the founding of our responses. Questions pondered might include the following: “Is there a purpose somehow lurking out there?”; “Do you have to be evil to get ahead in this world?”; “Is justice a childish outdated myth?”; “Why is suffering woven into the fabric of our existence?”; “Who am I?”; “Will I or some part of me survive my death?”. This course satisfies the LAS 6 requirement.

PL/WS 2990 Dystopian Literature

Through the lens of literature, this course examines the concept and context of the ways dystopian literature has been imagined by writers as a means of social and cultural commentary. Through close reading of the novels and short stories, students will analyze the various dimensions and repeating symbols of the imagined dystopian future. We will ask ourselves the ways in which humanity is defined when humans inhabit a frightening and dangerous place.

This is a reading and writing intensive course.

PL/WS 3990 Sex and Social Justice

Human dignity is frequently violated on grounds of sex or sexuality.” So, Martha Nussbaum tells us at the beginning of her work, Sex and Social Justice. While all societies organize themselves and socialize their members around the categories of sex and gender, Nussbaum calls our attention to the reality that, worldwide, many have done so by establishing a hierarchy of power based on sex, resulting in the oppression of women as women, and a denial of basic rights to those who do not conform to established gender roles, stereotypes, or culturally normative sexual practices. While the veracity of this claim can be well documented, before nodding our heads in agreement we will want to ask a basic question: on what grounds do we make the claim that human dignity “ought” to be respected, and what does it mean to do so? This course will begin with attempting to understand the basis for

believing human beings do in fact possess an inherent dignity that should be protected by laws, institutions, and cultural traditions. We will then apply this understanding to an inquiry into how cultural understandings of sex and gender can/have created a legacy of injustice based on these categories. In doing so, we may also find that some of our most intimate self-understandings are not of our own making. This course satisfies the LAS 6 requirement.

PL 2990 Star Trek and Philosophy

Often referred to as the “thinking person’s Star Wars,” STAR TREK has been the subject of much philosophical debate and thought. Attempting to go beyond science fiction, Gene Roddenberry, creator of Star Trek, boldly went where no television show had gone before by raising important questions about such philosophical themes as the nature of reality, knowledge, ethics and God. At its heart, STAR TREK is really a show about humanity, about ourselves. Through the eyes of its alien races, each one of which represents a particular trait, good or bad, of humanity, we can see ourselves—what we have been, what we are, and what we hope to become.

The main focus of this course is on the essence of humanity, or personhood, and what particular elements of personhood establish the ground for civil rights. Just what is a person? Grounding itself in philosophy, the course will examine this issue in light of Ancient, Medieval, Modern and Contemporary philosophical theories of what makes a person a person. In the characters of Data, Seven of Nine, The Doctor, and others, Star Trek gives us key examples of non-humans—an android, Borg, and hologram—who strive to gain civil rights. Through them, we can learn about ourselves and about groups here on Earth who have fought similar battles to be recognized as equals and afforded the civil rights and respect that all persons command. Alongside this theme, the course will also investigate the theme of tolerance, of getting along with others who are vastly different from ourselves.

A variety of STAR TREK episodes will be viewed, analyzed, and discussed. The course takes Star Trek: Picard as its starting point, and from there works through the history of Star Trek from The Original Series all the way up to the present. The overall course format will be “Socrates Café” style; this is a student-centered style with a high emphasis on discussion whereby students learn from one another with the professor serving in the role of learning facilitator.

The NEC MISSION component specifically addressed by this course is a “respect for the varied qualities of individuals, communities, and the world.” This is achieved through an examination of just what qualities make an individual a person, and what makes a person a member of a community, be it local, global, or in our case, galactic. This course satisfies the LAS 2 requirement.

PO 3990 Diplomacy

Diplomacy in Action: Interested in learning about diplomacy and international relations directly from the practitioners? In this course we’ll be combining a regional and thematic approach to U.S. Foreign policy with weekly meetings with current and former diplomats who serve in the front lines of the State Department and International Organizations. This class will be conducted by zoom to facilitate direct interaction with policy makers and experts.

PO/HSS 3990 Tpcs: Ldrshp in Times of Crisis

The importance of servant leadership, personal accountability, and truth telling is the course's chief aim. This course will promote positive change and growth in all types of organizations by uncovering wellsprings of accountable and responsible leadership, as well as, broaden the knowledge and awareness of leaders in all professions by helping them to speak truth to power.
