ResLife Important Information

Spring has finally arrived in Henniker, just in time for April and the final push to the end of the Spring 2025 semester. April is an exciting time of year in Residential Life and Housing as we finish up the 25-26 Housing Selection process and put the final touches on a variety of exciting programs and events happening in these last few weeks of the semester. Please take note of the following upcoming important dates for your student:

2025-2026 Housing Assignments

April 18th: 2025-2026 Housing and Meal Plan Assignment official letters sent to students' NEC emails on or before this date.

Summer Housing

Friday, April 25th: Deadline to sign up for Summer Housing. The cost is \$1,500 for each 7-week term. There is no meal plan service available during the summer term.

Residence Hall Closure

Thursday, May 1st @ 7PM: Residence Halls close for all students, except for graduating seniors and approved summer housing residents. Students should plan to leave campus when they have completed their on-campus academic requirements for the semester or by 7PM on May 1st, whichever comes first.

Fall 2025 Move In

Saturday, August 23rd: Returning Student Move-In for Fall 2025 semester. RAs, Peer Leaders, Diversity Ambassadors, and Fall Athletes should consult their supervisor or coach for their fall move-in information.

Student Financial Services Updates

The 25-26 FAFSA March 1 priority filing date has passed but you can still file your FAFSA to apply for financial aid for the upcoming fall semester. Please submit your 25-26 FAFSA at studentaid.gov as soon as possible.

Graduating seniors who borrowed student loans must complete loan exit counseling at studentaid.gov prior to graduation.

Work study jobs are still available for this semester and for the summer semester.

To apply, follow these steps:

- Visit nec.peopleadmin.com
- Click "Log in/Create Account" on the left-hand side.
- Enter your NEC email address and password. If you're a new student, you might need to reset your password.
- Once logged in, click "Search Student Jobs."
- Browse the available jobs.
- Click "View Details" for the job you're interested in.
- Click "Apply for this job" to submit your job application.

Summer term Pell grants are available for Pell grant eligible students to help pay for summer term courses. The Pell Grant amount depends on the number of credits enrolled, SAI (from FAFSA), and remaining eligibility. After registering for summer courses, students will automatically receive the maximum grant they qualify for.

Financial aid appointments are available for students and parents to help with filing the FAFSA, help with loan exit counseling, applying for a work study job or inquiring about summer Pell grants. Schedule an appointment online here.

A Message from Mentoring Program

South Korea Immersion Trip

We traveled for an LAS 7 course called Storytelling as Research that asks students to read a narrative, travel to the location of the narrative, isolate a global problem they observe during travel to research, and then they create a qualitative research project to research the topic at the local level. This semester, we read Blaine Harden's Escape from Camp 14, which tells Shin Dong Hyuk's story of escaping a North Korean prison camp he was born into. Since we're not able to travel to North Korea, we went to South Korea to visit the DMZ and learn more about North Korean defectors. We had the opportunity to interview a woman who had willingly paid a broker to help her exit North Korea, but instead of having a factory job in China as promised, was sold to a Chinese man for forced marriage

We also visited the War & Women's Rights Museum, which chronicles the lives of the Japanese Comfort Women, who were a group of South Korea women tricked into sexual slavery during the Japanese occupation of South Korea. For decades, no one really knew that this had occurred until a few brave women told their story in the 1980s and began to demand that Japan acknowledge what had occurred and apologize to the women who were taken. While focusing on the Comfort Women, the museum also acknowledges how women are treated in times of war throughout the world, including the Vietnamese women who were mistreated by Korean soldiers during the Vietnamese war.

This photo was taken at the DEA Training Academy in Quanticp, Virginia. Students and faculty were given a tour of the DEA Clandestine Drug Lab.




Humanities Viewbook
