- Navigate to Registration
 - Click on the “Student Services and Financial Aid” tab
 - Click on “Registration”
 - Once in the registration module, click on “Register for Classes”
 - Select the correct term
 - Search for sections under Find classes tab. Leave fields blank to search all sections (if you already have a plan, go to next section)
- Add sections to your Summary
 - Find Classes: Click “Add” next to the desired section from the search results
 - Enter CRN: Add by CRN if known
 - Plans: If you already created a pre-registration plan, it will appear here. Click Add All or Add on a specific section from your plan.
- Once all desired classes are added, review the Schedule (calendar) at the bottom left pane to review for time conflicts.
- **Register by clicking Submit at the bottom right of the Summary pane**
 - Classes that are at the 5000-level or above are graduate courses and you may need permission to register
 - Errors (full courses, pre-requisites, etc) will appear in red and will require permission to override
 - To remove a course, use the drop down in the “Action” column and select “remove”, then hit “Submit” on the bottom right of the screen.
- Once registered, return to the registration menu and use the “View Registration Information” module to review your class schedule for the term.

AHT 2990 Latin American Art

The course will introduce the artistic traditions of Latin America from ancient times to the present. We'll explore the visual arts of the Olmec, Mayan and Aztec civilizations of Mexico, the Muisca and Tairona peoples of Colombia, and the Chavín, Moche, Nazca, and Inca cultures of Peru in their aesthetic, political, spiritual, and social contexts. We'll also consider the effects of the Spanish Conquests on art and architecture during the Colonial period. In the nineteenth century, newly independent Mexican artists depicted a burgeoning national identity in landscape, genre painting, printmaking, and portraiture. We'll discuss twentieth-century modernists like Diego Rivera and Frida Kahlo, and contemporary Latin American artists. The course will cover a variety of media, including extraordinary works in gold and jade, magnificent pyramids, ceramics, paintings, and textiles.

AHT 3990 Histry of Narrative Cmmrcel Art

This course examines the evolution of the picture narrative by focusing on three aspects of narrative art: Illustration, Sequential Art, and Animation (the moving image). The history of illustration will act as the backbone of the course through analysis of its origins in illuminated manuscripts, through the golden age of illustration in America, to the present and connect to both Comics and Animation. Students of this course will explore how public perceptions of illustration and comics have changed, as we grapple with the innovations and controversies associated with the fields. An exploration of the history of animation, its sources in drawing, painting, photography, film, video, and digital media, its various innovators, styles, and techniques, its relationship with cinema, and its reliance on the development of creative and presentation technologies.

AR 2990 ST: Typography

This class will introduce students to the core principles of typography. Through a series of progressively complex studio projects supported by exercises, readings, lectures, presentations, and software tutorials, students will be exposed to a solid foundation for using typography purposefully and expressively. Because typography as a practice demands both innovation and attention to detail, creative thinking and craft will be of equal importance. Though we will begin by discussing lettering, fonts and their design, this course will go beyond the letterforms themselves and delve into effectively structuring information, digital typesetting and layout.

AR 2990 Sp Tp: Visual Print Marketing

This cross-disciplinary course involves students from different fields and interests (illustrators, photographers, designers, marketers, and writers) in all aspects of creating promotional print and web materials in branding and promoting the humanities at NEC. Potential materials created for print may include a variety of collateral material suitable for promotional print (trifolds, postcards, stickers,

inserts, bookmarks, viewbook, etc.). Students will work individually and collaboratively to research, photograph, write copy, design and edit a variety of materials toward production for informational brochures and recruitment. Students will have portfolio ready materials at the conclusion of the course.

AR 3990 ST: Screenprinting – course description coming soon

CJ 2990 Counter Intllgnce & Insdr Thrt

Insider Threat: Betrayal from Within. This course will include a primer on the world of espionage and spy craft, an overview of the moral and ethical dilemmas of spying, and focus on the psychology of the spies themselves -- including the motivations of betraying trust. There will be multiple case studies provided and the student will be introduced into the art of counterintelligence. The course will revolve around the themes of human vulnerabilities and motivation and why people betray their country to commit espionage.

CJ 2990 Crime and the Aging Population

This 4-credit course will examine the relationship of crime and the older members of our population. The "graying of America" is a social phenomenon that is a first-time event, the increasing numbers of the aging baby boomer portion to our population. This course will look at older Americans as victims of crime, perpetrators of crime, and the impact that each has upon the criminal justice system and society. Social and Criminal Justice policies that are established to deal with this problem will also be reviewed. Older offenders and older victims cannot be treated the same way as their younger counterparts, creating areas of special concern to the justice system. Applicable social and criminal justice theories that help to identify and define the dilemma of dealing with older persons as victims and/or perpetrators will be explored, as well as recommended avenues of justice from organizations such as the U.S. Department of Justice, the Police Executive Research Forum, and the American Association of Retired Persons (AARP).

CJ 4990 CJ Employment Process Lab

This 7-week course is designed to help students gain a deep understanding of the criminal justice job hiring process. Students will explore the various steps involved, learn how to navigate each stage, avoid common mistakes, and present themselves in the best possible light. The course includes opportunities for mock interviews with criminal justice professionals, practice police exams, and a physical agility test. This lab is a required component of the CJ 4010 course.

CW 2990 Sp Tp: Visual Print Marketing

This cross-disciplinary course involves students from different fields and interests (illustrators, photographers, designers, marketers, and writers) in all aspects of creating promotional print and web materials in branding and promoting the humanities at NEC. Potential materials created for print may include a variety of collateral material suitable for promotional print (trifolds, postcards, stickers, inserts, bookmarks, viewbook, etc.). Students will work individually and collaboratively to research, photograph, write copy, design and edit a variety of

materials toward production for informational brochures and recruitment. Students will have portfolio ready materials at the conclusion of the course.

DES 2990 ST: Web Design – course description coming soon

HS 2210 America at War: Wrld War I

The First World War: Unpacking history's second greatest conflict.

This course provides a comprehensive historical look at World War I (1914-1918). It considers what was (then) the most destructive conflict in all human history from numerous angles, including the war's relationship to: nationalism; colonialism; the Industrial Revolution; weapons of mass destruction; as well as broader political, social and religious changes of the early twentieth century. In conjunction with these primary considerations, there will be weekly profiles of the larger-than-life personalities who influenced - and were influenced by - the war.

HSS 2990 Counter Intlgnc & Insdr Thrt

Insider Threat: Betrayal from Within. This course will include a primer on the world of espionage and spy craft, an overview of the moral and ethical dilemmas of spying, and focus on the psychology of the spies themselves -- including the motivations of betraying trust. There will be multiple case studies provided and the student will be introduced into the art of counterintelligence. The course will revolve around the themes of human vulnerabilities and motivation and why people betray their country to commit espionage.

LAS 1110 Apocalypse, Now or Later

This course will explore the five mass extinctions that have occurred in earth's history and hypothesize what, if anything, may cause the sixth to occur. Focusing on the natural environment, students will explore apocalyptic fiction to identify common themes, compare them to real life data, and create their own apocalyptic fictional tales. Discussions on the human-nature connection, climate change, conservation efforts, sustainability, and cultural connections to nature will drive the course. Students will also be given the opportunity to explore the local natural environment through a series of experiential learning activities.

LAS 1110 Are We Living in the Matrix

“The Matrix” raises the question: Is any of this real? Using “The Matrix” as a starting point, through philosophy, art and religion, the course examines humanity’s relationship to a nature which may or may not even be out there, and traces the implications for both alternatives. Along with covering other works of sci-fi that carry similar themes, the course examines the philosophers whose ideas were the inspiration for The Matrix, such as Socrates, Plato and Descartes. The main assignments will be project-based and will mirror real things that real people do in the real world (if there is one, that is). Students will gain competencies in understanding core philosophical concepts and their impact on humanity, nature, and the environment, explaining these concepts by adapting them to new audiences, and relating them to real-world issues and problems.

LAS 1110 Ends of the World as We Know It

This course will explore how American culture sometimes labels various events or processes as cataclysm or apocalypse. First, we will examine how chattel slavery combined with cotton culture to change the landscape of America, culminating in the cataclysmic American Civil War. Next we will explore the role of natural disaster and end-of-the-world scenarios in popular culture and ask how this might affect how we deal with the reality of climate change or nuclear holocaust. Finally, we will consider how our political culture has come to grips with the possibility of the apocalyptic predictions of climate change in the near future

LAS 1110 Food, Farms, and the Future

This course is a seminar that explores one of the oldest and most essential intersections of humans and their environment: agriculture. The course will focus in particular on sustainability and local farming. A multidisciplinary course, it will explore the connections between agriculture and literature, arts, sciences, and history while looking to the uncertain future of farming. A strong emphasis is placed on the development of critical thinking and writing skills. It is designed to meet the LAS1110 requirements for new students

LAS 1110 Getting Away From it All: Human Voices Respond to Wilderness

Getting Away from It All: Human Voices in Response to Wilderness examines the human language applied to the wilderness experience as both metaphor and as an instrument of intentional moral engagement that roots us to the human experience. Exploring various historical and cross-cultural metaphors of wilderness as a starting point, we will move to an examination of contemporary writers who speak to the value of the “self” found in the wholeness of human solitude. Students will be asked to reflect on their role in the natural community in order to examine the ways in which the concept of “wilderness” illuminates the value of human wholeness.

LAS 1110 Teasing Death with Adventure

Why do humans feel the need to challenge themselves in the most dangerous conditions nature has to offer? is a central focus of this LAS 1 course. In this course the class will explore the psyche, development, and connection to nature of mountaineers, downhill bikers, backcountry skiing, and more. By developing a passion and connection to nature humans have sought to challenge the human body and the mind in pushing limits that can often result in tragedy and seemingly impossible survival. This course will also examine and attempt to understand the real fight or flight when survival skills are tested in the most critical situations. Students will reflect on literature and films that exemplify these human phenomena. The format of this course will include reading, films, reflection, journaling, discussion, and research. Students in this course will be expected to spend time outside. Students in this class will learn why humans, cross culturally, seek adventure and tease death in a natural environment utilizing minimal technology.

LAS 1110 Will Climate Change My Life?

As we enter the social and environmental disruptions of a rapidly changing climate, what is, and will be, the impact on you?

This course is designed to help students understand a global environmental problem in the context of their own lives. To reach this point students will research and discuss the scientific method, climate research techniques, and the current predictions of climate change impacts on a global, national and regional scale. We will explore the inherent social issues of a global event including climate refugees, social justice, economic disruption, and cultural change and how these could impact students.

Given a background in the current science, students' final project will be to design a lifestyle concept map. It will serve as a visual framework of the impact of climate change on an individual, and an outline of behavior that could reduce greenhouse gasses and mitigate the impact of climate change

LAS 1120 Conflict on Campus: The Ethics of College Student Life

Is it okay to use AI for completing assignments? Should the government dictate what students can and cannot learn? Should a trans student athlete have the right to play on the team of their gender? Should a religious university have to recognize an LGBTQA student club? This course takes a practical approach to the many ethical and social issues facing American college campuses today, from cheating and plagiarism to free speech and campus protests. Spotlights the community of college students on America's campuses, this course covers a diverse array of social, ethical, and political issues that concern the civic environment and democratic values of campus communities. Beginning with a foundation in ethics including consequential and categorical reasoning, students will cover multiple case studies and real-life stories in the news, including those right here on the NEC campus, and gain valuable skills in recognizing the complexity of issues and dealing with them in a thoughtful and critical manner. The course is especially recommended for student activists and those who participate in student government. Assignments will be project-based and include a presentation plus other real-world based scenarios.

LAS 1120 Empathy and the Liberal Arts

Have you ever gotten the chills watching a spider crawl on someone's arm? What about winced in pain when someone else hit his or her forehead on a low-hanging beam? Have you ever identified with a fictional character's struggle you read in a book? The spider wasn't on your arm; the beam didn't hit your forehead, and you're not the character in the book. In each instance, however, you seemed to experience another's suffering. That's empathy, and whenever empathy is lacking, so, too, are the capacity to see others as fully human and the values inherent to a democracy—impossible becomes the affirmation in Article 1 of The Universal Declaration of Human Rights that, "All human beings are born free and equal in dignity and rights. They are endowed with reason and conscience and should act towards one another in a spirit of brotherhood." The recent groundswell of interest in empathy, however,

may be due more to our growing unwillingness to understand and share the feelings of another, especially those unlike ourselves. Using an interdisciplinary approach, this course explores the critical role empathy plays in any Civic environment based upon democratic values and in solving increasingly complex societal ills as well as how literature can help us empathically "enlarge ourselves," as Richard Rorty puts it.

LAS 3110 When Democracy Fails

This seminar-style course will be conducted as a community engaged learning experience. Students will work collaboratively with off-campus partners to organize and host a public program designed to foster deliberation and understanding within our democratic system. The course will examine the major tenets of democracy, investigate examples of democracies that have declined or fallen, and explore the challenges facing contemporary democracy today both in the United States and abroad. No prior course work in this field is expected or required.

PE 1990 Dodgeball

This course will include instruction of the basic rules, techniques and skills needed to play dodgeball at any level. The student will also learn the mental, physical and social benefits of participation in dodgeball as a lifetime sport. No previous dodgeball skills are necessary.

PE 1990 Cornhole

This is a one credit course designed to give the student a basic background in the game of corn hole. This course will include instruction of the basic rules, techniques and skills needed to play corn hole at any level. The student will also learn the mental and physical benefits of participation in corn hole as a lifetime sport. No previous corn hole skills are necessary.

PE 1990 Hiking

This course will include instruction in the basics of hiking. Students will be instructed in hiking techniques and safety and will participate in hikes. This is a recreational class open to all students.

PP 2990 Intro to Insurance & Risk Management

This course introduces students to the nature of risk, risk identification, general risk management techniques, and the management of risk through insurance. It covers why the individual or corporation purchases insurance, what constitutes an intelligent insurance plan, what products are available in the insurance marketplace, and how those products are regulated.

PS 1990 Introduction to Well-being

This is an introduction to the scientific study of well-being. Emphasis will be placed on five core dimensions of well-being that include social, emotional, physical, environmental, and financial. The role of the scientific method in the development of skills associated with the dimensions of well-being will be explored. A significant portion of the class is dedicated to experiencing various well-being skills for self-improvement and improvement of the community, and bringing that experience into the classroom.

TH 2990 Mirror or Hammer? Arts&Society

"Art is not a mirror held up to society, but a hammer with which to shape it"
Using this quote from playwright Bertolt Brecht as a framework, we will look at contemporary and historical musicians, choreographers, theatre makers, protestors, and other performance artists using their voices and bodies to illuminate and/or change the society around them. We will consider whether these examples provide a) a mirror to help better understand the absence of or struggle toward human rights or b) a hammer with which to make changes toward freedom and equitable treatment.
